

Experimental Design



The first step in the experimental design process is to identify the research question. This is typically done by reviewing the literature and identifying gaps in knowledge. Once the research question is identified, the next step is to develop a hypothesis. A hypothesis is a statement that predicts the outcome of the experiment. It should be testable and falsifiable. 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PROBABILITY THEORY

Let X and Y be two independent random variables with probability density functions $f_X(x)$ and $f_Y(y)$ respectively. Then the joint probability density function of (X, Y) is given by

$$f_{X,Y}(x,y) = f_X(x) \cdot f_Y(y)$$

Let $Z = X + Y$. Then the probability density function of Z is given by

$$f_Z(z) = \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} f_X(x) \cdot f_Y(z-x) dx$$

Let $W = X - Y$. Then the probability density function of W is given by

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STATISTICS

Let $X_1, X_2, \dots, X_n$ be a random sample of size n from a population with mean μ and variance σ^2 . Then the sample mean $\bar{X}$ and sample variance S^2 are given by

$$\bar{X} = \frac{1}{n} \sum_{i=1}^n X_i$$

$$S^2 = \frac{1}{n-1} \sum_{i=1}^n (X_i - \bar{X})^2$$

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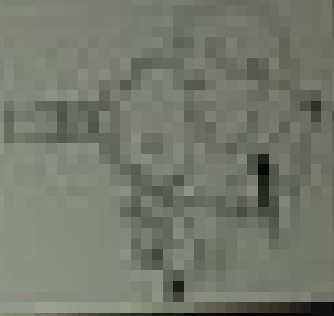


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THE HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES
